HUNDREDS of people have sought help for food as the cost of living crisis grips the Staffordshire

## **Come follow Christ in the footsteps of St Chad**

## I GOT RHYTHM

The Community of St Chad was formed around ten years ago. It is a dispersed community; open to anyone living throughout Lichfield Diocese and beyond, with over 90 official members, and many more who use the Community Handbook and prayer resources. Ours is a community founded on companion groups of three people who meet to pray together and who live out five Rhythms of Grace.

Rhythm One: By God's grace, I will seek to be transformed into the likeness of Christ. Each and every one of us will interpret this statement slightly differently, and it is our responsibility to work through the implications for ourselves. Perhaps living out this first rhythm would look like being honest in all we say and do, speaking and acting positively, checking in with ourselves on what material things we covet more than we should. Rhythm Two: by God's grace, I will be open to the presence, guidance and power of the Holy Spirit.

I live this second rhythm out by being open to the nudges of the Spirit. For example, as you walk past an unknown house there is that nudge to knock on the door. When someone says they are okay, the nudge to ask 'are you really?' God's Spirit is at work all around us and by being intentional we notice the things God is doing that we can join in with. Rhythm Three: by God's grace, I set aside time for prayer, worship and spiritual reading. Our corporate worship is fed by our individual devotion. Reading the Bible, using commentaries and study notes, and reading Christian books all feed us on our spiritual journey. There is now a plethora of apps including The Bible Project, PrayasyouGo, The



Daily Prayer App, and Lectio 365 which enable us to be fed wherever we are.

Rhythm Four: by God's grace, I will endeavour to be a gracious presence in the world, serving others and working for justice in human relationships and social structures. I find this rhythm to be the one that opens the armour around people's hearts and where

transformation happens in our communities. Working for justice means we do not shy away from conflict, but challenge unjust circumstances with grace and truth. Our

generosity and our willingness to give and receive the gifts of God's abundance leads us into deeper relationship with God and the communities we serve.

Rhythm Five: by God's grace I will sensitively share my faith with others and support God's mission both locally and globally.

The church can be inward looking, and this fifth rhythm encourages us to lift our heads and seek out the bigger picture of God's mission in the wider world. It encourages us to be imaginative in the way we present the gospel, to help our neighbours near and far as we live out our calling to share our faith.

These five Rhythms are not rules that dictate our behaviour, instead they form a foundation of self-examination helping us to see how we can grow as disciples of Christ. St Chad's Day is 2<sup>nd</sup> March 2023. ## **CANDLEMAS BELLS**

Many snowdrops found in churchyards and monastic sites have been planted as a symbol of purity and hope.

The first known cultivation of snowdrops in the UK was recorded in 1597 and, while it

is thought that pilgrims originally brought this beautiful flower to our shores, it was the Victorians who enthusiastically planted them in churchyards and cemeteries.

Snowdrops go by over 30 different local names including Dew Drops, Eve's Tear and February Fair-maids. They are also known as Candlemas Bells.

In the Middle Ages Candlemas (held on the 2<sup>nd</sup> of February) was the day when everyone in the parish brought their candles to church to be blessed by the priest. This was to ward off evil spirits. After a procession and the blessing, the candles were lit and set before the statue of the Virgin Mary. The snowdrop was the flower gathered to decorate the church at that time, so took on the name of that ancient tradition.

Snowdrops were used as a cure for headaches in the past, although the bulbs are poisonous. Today a compound from the bulb has been used to develop a dementia treatment.

The sight of snowdrops is often viewed as a welcome herald of spring. As they bloom so early, they do not rely on insects to pollinate them and tend to spread by bulb division. Insects which emerge early, particularly queen bumblebees, may find them a welcome source of food. Many churchyards have a good show of snowdrops and these early pollen sources can help insects that emerge unseasonably early in the spring due to changing weather patterns. Try to use any flower beds or pots you have to provide pollen and nectar from February through to the October.

# LENT GROUPS

This year we will, once again join with our Methodist friends. We will follow a York Course:

#### YOU CAN BE SERIOUS! MEETING JESUS AFRESH IN JOHN'S GOSPEL by David Wilbourne.

Whatever our church denomination, we all use the same Sunday Gospel from the Revised Common Lectionary. Year A focuses on Matthew, but during the first five Sundays of Lent, four of the Gospels are curiously from John. By basing each of the five sessions in this course on the previous Sunday's Gospel, David Wilbourne provides a brilliant connection to the preaching and teaching that has just taken place.

Serious yet full of life and humour, the course covers:

- Session 1: Temptation . . .
- On checking every word that comes out of the mouth of God
- Session 2: Strangers in the night . . .
- Nicodemus came to Jesus under cover of darkness: finding God in surprising places
- Session 3: The winner takes it all
- 'You worship what you do not know': upping our game with worship
- Session 4: I was blind but now I see
- 'A god who can be understood is no god'
- Session 5: Them bones, them bones, them dry bones, hear the word of the Lord!
- Contrasting events in John with parables in the Synoptics

The course booklet is accompanied by a lively CD, in which David Wilbourne and guests from various denominational backgrounds put forward their thoughts on the themes of the course.

We will meet in the Chapter House at St Luke's from 7pm on Thursdays 2<sup>nd</sup>, 9<sup>th</sup>, 16<sup>th</sup>, 23<sup>rd</sup> and 30<sup>th</sup> March.

## A Bit of History



It is now 60 years since the old St Luke's CE primary school served its last term at its original site just below the church before re-opening in a new and bigger building along Leek Road just after Easter in 1963. On this drawing by Percy Williamson you can see the old school among the trees. This was the view from the A53 in 1944. You can also see Sutton House on Brook Lane and Frank Stubbs's old house in Hallwater. (Frank was very much part of the village and was our church warden for several years.) Also above it on the left of the picture is the building which was part of The Mount at the junction of Church Lane and Brook Lane before its conversion into a house.

When the school was demolished the site became the current church car park. The school bell was rescued and now hangs in church to the left of the chancel near the pulpit. The then head, Mr R E Biddulph, along with a group of older children, made a scale model of the old school which hung in the vestibule of the new school for many years. Sadly it has disappeared and no-one seems to know what happened to it.

Did anyone in our present church congregation attend the old school (or know someone who did)? If so, maybe you would like to share information about your time there. Does anyone have a photo of it? I attended Sunday school in the old school for a few years in the 1950s but I was not a pupil.

At one time there was so little traffic that Church Lane was used as a playground! **Ros**
