were the King and Queen but they needed an Archbishop of Canterbury and Dean of Westminster. I


was delighted to be invited to be the ABC and Pat Kinshott from the church (and also a member of Endon Community Choir) took the role of the Dean.

# Come follow Christ in the footsteps of St Chad SUCCESS & FAILURE

As exam season begins to loom in requests at prayer meetings one of our school chaplains considers how we can all act when tested...

June is exam season here at Ellesmere College: Pass or fail. Succeed or fall flat. Hit or miss. Survive, thrive, or go under.... These are the thoughts running through our students' minds. Oh, and 'When will it be over?'

But the students aren't the only ones who are under pressure, subject to self-scrutiny, and hoping for the best. Teachers are seeing the fruits of their labours, sometimes over many years, and waiting, and hoping, and praying, that students have 'taken ownership' of their learning, disciplined themselves and arrived at the exams ready, eager, and relaxed. Parents too are pushing down their own anxieties so that they can better 'be there' for their children.

Student, teacher, and parent alike are coming to the end of their power, they are coming to the end of their control over outcomes, they are beginning to move into uncertainty, vulnerability, and – hopefully – humility.

And when we can't control the future, we begin to critique the past. We rake, mull, and sit in judgement over what we have already done. Questioning, doubting, realising that we probably haven't done everything we could to prepare ourselves, our students, and our children.

In these moments we have at least three choices: we can rest in God's forgiveness and grace, we can ignore our failures and feign ignorance when things go wrong, or we can give in to despair by enthroning ourselves as judge over the past.

Clearly the first option is preferable! But how do we get there? And I say we because it's not only students, teachers and parents who have to face uncertainty, let go of past failures, and find a way to face the future with hope. We all do. In fact, we are daily confronted with our lack of power, and with the unforeseeable consequences of a life that's never quite what it should be.

As a parent, as a teacher, and as a student I have drawn great, and I mean great comfort from the story of the triumphal procession – the story told on Palm Sunday. On that day Jesus rode into Jerusalem and the crowds praised him – as they should. As the Christ entered his city on a donkey the crowds exulted in the arrival of the Messiah – as they should. When his people saw the Word made flesh, they welcomed him – as they should. But they were praising the one they thought would overthrow the Romans, they were exulting in a victory through violence, and they were welcoming worldly freedom, not spiritual new life – individual liberty, not the rule of God.

So, they were right, and they were wrong. We too, all of us, are often right and wrong in our worship - at the same time. So often our worship centres on what God has done for us but fails to move to who God is in himself. We thank him for boosting our self esteem and supporting our plans but forget to listen to his cross-shaped vision for our lives.

It's the same with our whole lives: we're trying to get it right, but we're getting it wrong at the same time. We're a jumble of mixed motives, half baked commitments, and covert self-centredness. Whether we're studying, teaching, parenting... however we're trying to serve God in the world. We should expect that because what we do with our lives is part of our worship.

So, what does God do with the wrong-headed but rightly directed praise of the Palm Sunday crowd? He uses it to scare the authorities into crucifying Jesus; he used it to save the world! God transformed the shades of grey in their lives into the technicolour of an eternal Easter. The longing to see Rome vanquished from Israel is woven into Gods victory over sin, the violent victory envisioned by the crowds creatively contributes to the death of death on the cross, and the hope for personal autonomy becomes part of God's display of his own sovereign freedom.

So, as we let go of children, students, exam results, and control over the future we can find peace in the knowledge that God will weave all of our successes and our failures into his perfect plan. We can marvel at the power and compassion of Him who goes through death in order to draw the threads of our stories into one glorious his-story. And knowing what kind of God we have, we can choose humility, rest in God's grace, and find forgives as we give the future to Jesus.

# QUEENS, SUNNY SPOTS AND STICKY TONGUES

Old churchyards and other burial grounds have become a refuge for the Yellow Meadow Ant, *Lasius flavus*, a species found in

permanent pasture and meadow, now both rare habitats. You can tell if you have this lovely species in your site as it creates soil mounds or anthills over its nest, often against gravestones and facing the sun. The Yellow Meadow Ant is harmless, and the anthills are quite something, growing larger and larger over the years. Actually, the bulk of the ant nest is below ground, sometimes reaching 1m in depth. Within the nest the ants are protected, with temperature and humidity kept relatively constant. Here the ants are farmers, tending aphids which feed on the roots of the meadow grasses and then produce 'honeydew' – food for the ants.

Each of these mounds is started by a queen ant who lands in a warm sunny spot and starts a new colony. She lays eggs which hatch into worker ants who then go out to forage for food and make the nest. This is done by excavating in the ground and carrying innumerable particles of soil above ground level to build a series of chambers. As the number of workers increase so does the size of the mound. The little passages they make and travel through, are above and below ground. In the winter the whole colony retreats further underground away from the cold.

Anthills can be up to 100 years old and form a mini-habitat of their own. The ants need the warmth of the sun and so they trim back the grass growing on the mound surface and this encourages plants like lady's bedstraw and wild thyme. You may spot plants on ant mounds that are not found elsewhere within your churchyard. Whilst the anthills give the ants a level of safety, green woodpeckers feed on them, visiting the mounds and using their extraordinarily long, sticky tongues to feast on the ants.

When you next visit a burial ground, look out for anthills, large or small, and on a sunny day you will see the ants busy at work. If you see an anthill you can make a biological record for Yellow Meadow Ant even if you don't see the actual yellow coloured ant. Try using the iNaturalist app and photographing it. This is a useful species to record, as it is an indicator of ancient grassland, suggesting that your churchyard may hold many other treasures waiting to be identified.

## ST LUKE'S APCM.. all is not well!

14 of us gathered in the chapter house on the evening of May 24<sup>th</sup> to approve the accounts and hear from our treasurer that all is not well with our finances! Due to having to pay £2500 per month to the diocese for the Common Fund (formerly the Parish Share) St Luke's is running at a loss as our monthly income currently does not cover this as well as our other expenses such as fuel, maintenance and insurance. Outgoings for the last year amounted to £44, 719 and income amounted to £36, 493 leaving a deficit of £8,225. At this rate the church is on course for becoming bankrupt by the end of next year. Several fundraising events have been held over the last twelve months but the total raised was £2812 only enough to pay one month's contribution to the Common Fund with a little left over. It was felt important that knowledge of this situation should be made known to the wider congregation.

The PCC now comprises Barrie Jackson, Roger Simpson (appointed warden for one more year), Steve Dale (treasurer), Sue Forrester, Shirley Brindley, Sylvia Bradshaw, Neil Taylor, Deb Podmore, Jean Brough, Joe Porter and Ros Benson.

#### There has been no progress on the appointment of a vicar.

Sheila Simpson our electoral roll officer announced that the number on roll is now 68, being 50 resident and 18 non-resident.

Our quinquennial inspection is overdue but Roger is reluctant to go ahead as the church may not be able to afford any possible repairs.

On a positive note Deb Podmore presented a good report on the Connections service and Shirley Brindley reported on how well the Pastoral Team was being appreciated. Thanks were expressed to Revs Philip and Patricia for all their help and enthusiasm.



## **NEWSLETTER April 2023**

The last month has been an interesting one, in that we have been guieter than we have been for guite some while. The figures for the month are below with the figures for April 2022 in brackets:

**Total vouchers fulfilled** = 83 (85) No. of Adults fed = 126 (114) No. of Children fed = 74 (75)Total no. fed = 200 (189)

The reasons for the drop in usage are not entirely clear, partly due to distribution of the first part of the cost of living payment, from which a number of our clients have benefited. I think it is also a reflection of the superb work that Matt from Citizens Advice has been doing on behalf of our clients. We had our first formal review meeting of this service during the month with excellent feedback from both ourselves and Cheadle Foodbank, and clients of both centres. We had confirmation that the project has secure funding for three years and hopefully, by that time, the economic climate will be less problematic for so many to survive in. We also have a representative of the Co-op Bank attending the Foodbank on a monthly basis, to give our clients generic financial advice, including budgeting, managing debt and setting up direct debits. She is working closely with Matt to offer our clients a comprehensive package of financial advice and assistance.

I continue to work closely with our two main sources of donations – Morrison's and Sainsbury's. I have booked some dates over the summer when I and groups of volunteers will have a display in the Sainsbury's foyer to highlight the work that we are doing and we hope to hold a day's food drive at Morrison's in July. Once again, I am enormously grateful to our amazing team of volunteers for giving their time so generously.

In April we started our voucher scheme with Ash's Butchers. We issue £10.00 vouchers to those clients who are in particular need, which they can present at Ash's for goods to that value. Members of staff at Ash's are on hand to give advice on what to choose and how to cook their choice of product. This has been welcomed by our clients and I'll keep you posted on the progress of the project. We are fortunate to be able to offer this to our clients thanks to the financial donations of our wonderful supporters.

## CORONATION

Archbishop Justin Welby's Sermon

Colossians 1:9-17, Luke 4:16-21

Come Holy Spirit, set fill our hearts with the flame of your love.

We are here to crown a King, and we crown a King to serve.

What is *given* today is for the gain of all. For Jesus Christ announced a Kingdom in which

the poor and oppressed are freed from the chains of injustice. The blind see. The bruised and broken-hearted are healed.

That Kingdom sets the *aims* of all righteous government, all authority. And the Kingdom also sets the *means* of all government and authority. For Jesus doesn't grasp power or hold onto status.

The King of Kings, Jesus Christ, was anointed not to be served, but to serve. He creates the unchangeable law of good authority that with the privilege of power comes the duty to serve.

Service is love in action. We see active love in our care for the most vulnerable, the way we nurture and encourage the young, in the conservation of the natural world. We have seen those priorities in the life of duty lived by our King.

Today we have the honour of being in this Abbey with so many who show such love; you work with charities and organisations, you build community, you serve the nation in Armed Forces, in emergency services, and so many other ways. Next door are 400 or more extraordinary young people in St Margaret's Church, whose lives speak of service. Around the world in the Realms and Commonwealth are so many more. You live your lives for the sake of others.

The unity you show, the example you give, is what binds us together and offers societies that are strong, joyful, happy and glorious. They bear heavy weights for us.

And the weight of the task given today, Your Majesties, is only bearable by the Spirit of God, who gives us the strength to give our lives to others. With the anointing of the Holy Spirit, the King is given freely what no ruler can ever attain through will, or politics, or war, or tyranny: the Holy Spirit draws us to love in action.

This is promised by Jesus who put aside all privilege, because, as the first reading tells us, God will give all things for our sake, even His own life.


His throne was a Cross. His crown was made of thorns. His regalia were the wounds that pierced his body.

Each of us is called by God to serve. Whatever that looks like in our own lives, each of us can choose God's way today.

We can say to the King of Kings, God Himself, as does the King here today, 'give grace that in thy service I may find perfect freedom'.

In that prayer there is promise beyond measure, joy beyond dreams, hope that endures. By that prayer, for every King, every ruler, and, yes, for every person for all of us, we are opened to the transforming love of God.
