

We were saddened to hear of the passing of Elaine Morrey on December 3rd 2023. Elaine was a regular member of the congregation at St Luke's for many years. She usually attended the 11.00 am service as she preferred the less formal style of worship. She also enjoyed the company of young people and children easily related to her. Those who knew her well also

know that she didn't 'do' mornings so the 11.00 am service suited her better that 9.15 am. However she liked to form relationships with all church members. She was always there when help or support was needed. Her name would be on the tea rota at Well Dressing and she loved to help at the children's midweek club run by Rev Joyce. She was a faithful member of the Mothers' Union. She also enjoyed the bible study groups she attended, again lead by Rev Joyce. She was an asset to the prayer chain. Although poor hearing made passing on messages difficult she would always ask who needed prayers and would enquire about their progress months after - she was still praying for them. Over the last few years her health deteriorated and she was unable to come to church but she enjoyed, and appreciated, visits from the pastoral team.

About 3 years ago when her health deteriorated to the point where she was unable to look after herself she made the decision to move to a care home in Sussex nearer to her niece and nephew.

Our condolences go to Lauren and David (niece and nephew). Elaine will be remembered here in St Luke's as her name will be entered into our Book of Remembrance.

Project Manager, Lindsey Stockton writes...

Happy New Year and thank you for your support! I hope you had a happy and peaceful festive period and hopefully we will all soon get back to knowing what day of the week it is!! We were pretty busy in the run up to Christmas, but have been

quiet since. I'm sure this will change once the children return to school, and the referral agencies get back to normal working. We did not open on Boxing Day, but left emergency food boxes at St Edward's Church, should anyone have been in urgent need. In the end, none of these were required. Although December was busy, it was significantly quieter than December 2022 – figures in brackets – which I hope is a sign that things are starting to improve, but there are still many challenges to be faced as we go through the winter:

Total vouchers fulfilled	= 136	(173)
No. of Adults fed	= 201	(263)
No. of Children fed	= 108	(197)
Total no. fed	= 309	(460)

December was a month filled with donations – both food and money - from many different sources. Whilst not in any way wanting to single out any one donation, I have to commend all those linked to Leek Town Football Club, for the amazing amount gifted to us at their match on 16th December. Two of our Team Leaders attended the game – don't worry they're very keen fans so no arm twisting was involved! – and gathered an amazing 335.7kg of food and £207.00 in cash. This was the idea of their Marketing & Community Manager, and he is very keen that we should have an ongoing link with the club, which will be great for us, and I fully intend to be the one to attend the matches in the future!

We also gave toy donations to families in particular need, largely due to the generosity of gifts to the Salvation Army, with whom we work particularly closely at Christmas, but also to a collection held at The Original Factory Shop in Congleton. And, a small independent shop owner in Leek asked if we could nominate a family for her to support, which she did in great style, with some absolutely beautiful donations. We really did do as much as we could to ensure that our clients managed to have some sort of Christmas, and it was so heartwarming to see the happiness that we were able to provide. Despite the phenomenal generosity of so many around us, we do still need to buy food to maintain our stock levels. Last month 9.15% of our stock was purchased, compared with 5.81% in December 2022, so, a reminder again of the importance of monetary donations to help us in our work. If anybody wishes to make a donation, instructions are given on our website – leekdistrict.foodbank.org.uk - with the easiest method being via the Just Giving button. But I'm happy for anyone to contact me directly or to pop into the Foodbank on a Tuesday or Friday.

During my fortnight's holiday, I was overwhelmed by the number and variety of offers of donations and donations received. I've had to make a list so I don't lose track! We received a sizeable cash donation from Falco UK Ltd, based in Leekbrook, and a lovely individual donation from a beekeeper who gave us the money he made from his honey glut! I would like to emphasise how important monetary donations are. We need to purchase stock — 12% of our stock was purchased in November 2023 compared with 8% in November 2022.

Money given can be put towards individual projects, like the voucher scheme with Ash's Butchers, which enables our clients to have fresh meat. We welcomed a class from St Mary's Primary School and I also had the privilege of visiting 2nd Leek (All Saints) Brownies. It is really heartwarming to see and hear how informed young children seem to be about some of the financial issues faced by "grown-ups", and gives me hope for the future. With everything in pretty short supply, all donations are very gratefully received.

'Pathways' is Back!

The New Year often begins for many people with resolutions on how we can improve our lifestyle or learn something new in the coming year. These aspirations often focus on health and physical fitness goals, but it's also a good time to review our mental and spiritual wellbeing — maybe reflecting on questions such as, what interests me, what can I offer, what's my role, how could I serve my congregation and community? These are questions we would call 'vocation' questions.

We've had a popular introductory course for thinking about vocation in Lichfield Diocese for many years, and after a short break the Pathways course is back! The Vocations and Training team have reimagined Pathways to make it more flexible and accessible and we'd love you to come and join us. Pathways has three modules that run throughout the year. The modules are designed to prompt people to explore vocational questions through different books of the New Testament (The Gospel of Mark, 1 Corinthians and the Book of Acts). People can complete one, two or all three modules. Each module is design to be completed during an academic term, around 12 weeks in total. Each module is structured as below:

- Introduction 1 hour Zoom gathering.
- 4 weeks of online content (one section per week, around 1 hour)
- A mid-way 1 hour Zoom gathering.
- 3/4 weeks of online content (one section per week, around 1 hour)
- Final 1 hour Zoom gathering.

There are points throughout the online content where we will ask you to leave a comment on an online discussion board (forum) as part of the course. And there is the option at the end of a module to provide a final reflection. Our 'Exploring Vocation through Mark's Gospel' module begins on **Wednesday 24th January**, 7.30 – 8.30pm with an online Zoom together. Costs should not be a barrier, but we ask for £10 from your parish, per module. Please contact us if this is an issue. Applications need to be submitted through our online booking form which can be accessed from the website (search for Pathways). You will need your Incumbent/Vicar's agreement to join this course as well as access to a laptop/computer. Any questions contact Helen (helen.scheven@lichfield.anglican.org) There is also the option for deaneries to facilitate an in-person Pathways module(s) locally should you have the numbers for this – please contact Helen for further information about this option.

Winter Moths

When the nights are long and cold, we do not think of seeing insects, but spare a thought for the Winter Moth which can withstand freezing temperatures and can be seen on the wing between October and January.

For many of us, we see the Winter Moth in car headlights when driving in small lanes after dark, it is pale brown in colour and can be seen fluttering. They are attracted to light however, and so will come to a moth trap if you want a closer look. Winter Moths are widespread, occurring in many places with trees and shrubs, so not particularly a churchyard species but, as with so many other creatures, churchyards will be a haven for them, particularly if they provide a space away from artificial lights which can be so disorientating to insects.

Unusually, females cannot fly, they have small stubby wings and are dark grey, giving them camouflage as they clamber up tree trunks to summon males. The females attract a mate by giving off pheromones, which draw in the flying males. Their eggs are then laid on the bark of the tree and don't hatch until spring, when tiny green caterpillars emerge. The caterpillars feed on tree leaves, eating a range of species including oak, sycamore, beech and willow. Caterpillars can also travel from tree to tree by spinning long threads of silk which act as a sail, carrying them through the air.

In the spring Winter Moth caterpillars are an important food for woodland birds, particularly the tit family. In January there is less food around and these small birds can be seen searching within the crevasses and nooks and crannies of trees for a range of adult invertebrates including Winter Moths, and also the overwintering larvae of other species.

Why not take a torch-lit walk and see if you can see a Winter Moth or even, if you are lucky, a female on a tree trunk. Alternatively wait for spring and look in April or May for the caterpillars chomping leaves, or a bluetit eating a caterpillar! The caterpillars are tiny, green and have a dark stripe on the top of their bodies. If you care for a church or churchyard then please consider the insects when planning outdoor lighting, having dark areas or lights which go off for part of the night can be beneficial to many species.

And I said to the man who stood at the gate of the year:
"Give me a light that I may tread safely into the unknown".

And he replied:

"Go out into the darkness and put your hand into the Hand of God.
That shall be to you better than light and safer than a known way".
So I went forth, and finding the Hand of God, trod gladly into the night.
And He led me towards the hills and the breaking of day in the lone East.

So heart be still:
What need our little life
Our human life to know,
If God hath comprehension?
In all the dizzy strife
Of things both high and low,
God hideth His intention.

God knows.

His will is best. The stretch of years
Which wind ahead, so dim
To our imperfect vision,
Are clear to God. Our fears
Are premature; In Him,
All time hath full provision.

Then rest: until
God moves to lift the veil
From our impatient eyes,
When, as the sweeter features
Of Life's stern face we hail,
Fair beyond all surmise
God's thought around His creatures
