A Builder's Vision ADD TASKS TO CREATE HOPE

Our Bishop of Stafford's final Pastoral Letter

A tourist visiting Italy came across a construction site.

"What are you doing?" the tourist asked the three stonemasons.

"I'm cutting the stone," answered the first.

"I'm cutting stone for 1,000 lire a day," the second said.

"I'm helping to build a cathedral," said the third.

I like this anecdote because it speaks to me of the importance of vision.

The third stonemason was able to life his eyes above the daily routine of his work to envisage the final result. His contribution was a part of something much bigger and together all of those involved in the project would produce something tremendous and beautiful – a cathedral dedicated to the Glory of God.

I was reminded of this when I read recently that the Sagrada Familia Cathedral in Barcelona is finally due to be finished in 2026. The first stone was laid in 1882 and its architect, Antoni Gaudi died in 1926 and is buried in the crypt. His vision has been 'caught' by others who have continued his work and taken his ideas forward.

For 'vision' to be successful it has to be shared by others. That is why a good Mission Action Plan needs to evolve out of a Parish Away Day where all have had the opportunity to contribute their ideas and suggestions.

Our Nation at this time is lacking in a clear shared vision. Consequently people want to go in their own direction and are critical and ungenerous about other possibilities. We have to be honest and say that wherever we are in the continuing BREXIT saga, our Nation has been torn into shreds and it will take time before we have a sense of being reunited.

As a Church we have a role to play in serving our communities by bringing people together to share their vision for the future and to help identify common threads. For example, as a grandfather I want my grandchildren to grow up safely, have a roof over their heads, food on their plates and an education that will enable them to do what they want to later in life. Surely, this unites me with all other grandparents?

Once shared vision is established there needs to be discussion as to how this vision can be turned into a reality. A vision without a task is a dream. A task without vision is drudgery. But the two together are the hope of the world. We need to think and pray about the specific roles that we can play in this process. Perhaps too many of us are content to 'cut the stone' rather than 'build the cathedral'.

This is going to be a long process but a journey of 1,000 miles begins with a single step and I would encourage every worshipping congregation in our Diocese to pray about the contribution that you are going to make in this process of reconciliation.

We are working on a shared vision for our Diocese to guide us during the coming decade. This 'Direction of Travel' is a work in progress and there is much consultation, reflection and prayer still to happen but it is already exciting and offers all sorts of possibilities.

As Ann and I move on to the next phase of our ministry, we are thrilled that we are leaving a Diocese that is in such good heart and positive about future growth. We are less thrilled at leaving so many wonderful friends but are really grateful for the privilege of being able to be part of the journey and can only thank you for your love, support and prayers.

May God bless you as your vision enables you to build not a cathedral but God's Kingdom!

The Mighty Yew

The yew trees found in our churchyards are really very special, so special that ecologists describe them as 'globally important'! No other country has such a richness of ancient and veteran yews and many churchwardens find themselves the guardians of these natural giants. When the leaves fall from deciduous trees, we tend to notice the evergreens more and yews, whether two or two thousand years old are synonymous with churchyards.

We can speculate as to why yews are found in churchyards; a relic from an older pagan site, a symbol of eternal life and death, some winter colour to decorate the church at Christmas? Whatever the reasons, churchyards have acted as sanctuaries for yews which have been felled across the wider landscape from medieval times onwards. Demand for longbows, removing poisonous trees from farmland and more recently, extraction of anti-cancer drugs from bark and foliage have all taken their toll on the yew.

If you are looking after yew trees in your churchyard then follow some simple rules. Remove encroaching ivy and keep the ground beneath the yew clear of heavy items such as cars, bins, sheds or compost piles. Avoid pruning if possible and let branches reach down to the ground where they will take root. In this way we will nurture this national treasure – our oldest trees.

HOSTEL FOR THE HOMELESS IN

HANLEY

When we were invited to join members of St Chad's congregation for their harvest lunch on October 6th we had no idea who the guest speaker was to be until it was announced at the joint service the week before. So it was a lovely



surprise to meet and then listen to Lou Macari, who as you all will know, is a former manager of Stoke City FC. (Oh and yes I did tell him I'd watched "Marvellous" six times!!) However, on this occasion football and Nello were not the reasons for his visit as he explained how he came to set up his shelter for the homeless in Hanley. In response to a statement that the council considered that the homeless were apparently well catered for, he went into Hanley at night to see for himself. He found many homeless adults lying on pavements and in shop doorways. Although there are shelters in our city provided by the YMCA and the Salvation Army for example, there was clearly a need for more. As a result he has set up a new hostel in Regent Road run by paid staff. This currently caters for 48 adults most of whom are drug addicts. He was honest about this difficult problem as any money handed out to these folk is immediately spent on drugs but the hostel can at least provide a bed and food. For some of them a day trip to Blackpool was the first time they had seen the sea and they had a great time on the rides at The Pleasure Beach.

Lou explained that the hostel is really no longer adequate and needs to be replaced. Although he did not ask for money it was clear he wanted to raise awareness among the wider community of the problems in our city centre just four miles away. He invited us to visit the shelter in Hanley to see what it's like. Homelessness is still a big problem which is not going away any day soon.

Thanks Lou for enlightening us and also our thanks of course to everyone at St Chad's especially Joan and Freda who provided us all with a delicious casserole lunch followed by a selection of sumptuous desserts.

The Real Advent Calendar is designed to share and celebrate the true meaning of Christmas so that Christ is not written out of Christmas.



LEEK FOOD BANK UPDATE



Dear Friends

We give thanks for our volunteers who give their time to help those who find themselves in less fortunate circumstances and we thank God that he gives each one of us the strength and ability to carry out the necessary tasks to meet the needs.

We also thank our donors who continue to play their very important part by ensuring that the required food is available for distribution as and when required.

The food donations for September totalled 1097 kg The food distributed for September totalled 901 kg

- Vouchers fulfilled 38
- Adults fed 51
- Children fed 33

This is a 10.5% increase on the same month of 2018

All the new racking has now been fitted in the warehouse and this has added to our storage ability and helping ease the work of volunteers in handling the food as it moves in and out of the warehouse.

Our Donor Coordinator, Janine Tickle, has done a great job in speaking to the manager at the new Iceland store that recently opened in Leek and from 11th October it will be a further permanent collection point for donations.

As we enter into the busy winter period we ask for your continued support as this is a difficult time of year to meet demand but with your continued help we can go a long way to conquering hunger in Leek and District. Please remember donations of Christmas food as we will be pleased to receive them from now onwards.


