There's no knowing where you might end up when you dial **116123**. Although, in the early days, your local Samaritans branch served the local community, this is no longer the case. Now a computer scans all the Samaritans phone lines which are active, looks for those which are ready to receive a call, and assigns your call to the phone which has been idle for the longest time. This period is often less than two seconds at night, when demand is high and the number of volunteers on duty is low. The way in which calls are allocated means that you could be having a conversation with a Samaritan who is based anywhere from Shetland to Jersey. There are 199 actual branches of the Samaritans, and two virtual branches, of no fixed abode, who deal with letters and music festivals.

**David Matthews** is a man with a mission. He has set out to visit all 201 Samaritans branches, walking from one to the next, and doing a duty shift at each. In all he will cover 6000 miles, and take about two years to complete his route. On his way he wants to raise funds for the Samaritans, to increase awareness of the organisation, and, if possible, to recruit new volunteers. I met him when he visited Leek branch; after his shift he was on Moorlands radio, and



spoke with the Leek Post and Times reporter, before going on to Stoke. At that stage he had done roughly one-third of the mileage, and visited one-third of the Samaritans branches. You may have seen him, wearing a bright green Samaritans T-shirt with "6000 miles" printed below the logo, walking steadily through whatever the weather was doing at the time. By the time you read this, he will probably be somewhere in the region of Gloucester.



David is a man of quiet determination, and vision. He is convinced that the task he has taken on is supremely worthwhile. His physical fitness is impressive, as is his emotional stamina in responding to so many troubled callers as he goes on his way.

Let's wish him God speed on his pilgrimage.



### **Come follow Christ in the footsteps of St Chad**

### A VAPOUR TRAIL THROUGH ADVENT Stillness and the Patron Saint of Preparation? Bishop Clive's Pastoral Letter - December 2019

Like a seasonal affliction, it is hard for regular churchgoers to avoid John the Baptist at this time of year. He bestrides the Advent landscape like a particularly fierce colossus, his presence disruptive, abrasive, unsettling; his call to repentance an invitation to internal combustion. Oh, that we could airbrush him out of our build up to Christmas and highlight other figures less likely to frighten the children – or their parents!

And yet as we follow John the Baptist's vapour trail through Advent, we can see among the smoke and debris a message for ourselves and for our society that is both very simple and potentially explosive.

It is for good reason that countless sermons will be preached in the coming weeks on the themes of 'preparation' and 'waiting', themes that are at the heart of John's ministry and also that resonate powerfully with most peoples' experience of the build up to Christmas i.e. a mixture of anticipation and taskdriven preparation. There will also be numerous exhortations from the pulpit encouraging worshippers to try and find some stillness and space to counteract the hyper frenzy and focus on what it is we are preparing for. But while John the Baptist is the Patron Saint of Preparation, it is difficult to imagine, from what we know of him, that he was an icon of stillness. He was in far too much of a hurry, his mission much too urgent. What we see in John's ministry is the truth that waiting for the future involves transforming the present.

I remember seeing a production of 'Godspell' in London when I was young and the song 'Prepare ye the way of the Lord' is still burned into my memory. It also serves as a reminder that this is our calling too and Advent presents us with so many opportunities to transform the present as we actively wait for the future. There are evangelistic opportunities presented by full churches at Christingles and Carol services and of course there are endless opportunities to witness to our faith through acts of generosity and service. John was a prophet, calling people to a radically different way of life. Perhaps our prophetic calling this Christmas, may be to demonstrate that our way of celebrating is based on simplicity, generosity and sustainability?

There is mounting evidence that the climate emergency is prompting a widespread questioning of western lifestyles, with our excessive materialism and culture of instant disposability increasingly under the microscope. Does all this stuff really make us happy? And how can we tolerate the impact on the planet of all that we waste and dispose of so irresponsibly?

So this Advent, after the example of John the Baptist, let us be alive to all the possibilities the season brings, from personal renewal to societal transformation, and to play whatever part we can in helping to bring them about through prayer and action.



within one or more of the churchyard trees; most frequently found in lime, poplar, ash, hawthorn and fruit trees. It is a partial parasite, making some of its own food but taking minerals from the host tree. Known as a 'cure-all', herbalists have long valued the medicinal properties of mistletoe, particularly useful against fits and anxiety. Research is currently underway to investigate the anticarcinogenic properties of the plant.

Mistletoe is also a plant of druids, believed in the past to have magical powers perhaps due to its evergreen nature within a deciduous tree, plus its ability to live away from the ground with no obvious roots. Druids (including Getafix in the Asterix books!) favoured mistletoe from oaks, cut with a golden sickle, although oak is seldom a host tree.

Look out for mistle thrushes stripping mistletoe of its white berries in winter. The Latin name for mistletoe is *Viscum album* whilst the mistle thrush is *Turdus viscivorus*. *Turdus* is the Latin for 'thrush' and *viscivorus* comes from *viscum* for 'mistletoe' and *vorare* 'to devour'. They certainly seem to favour mistletoe and will vigorously defend a good clump from other birds, saving the berries for hard times when other food might be scarce or covered in snow. The seed within the berry passes through the thrush and may land on a young bough of a tree where it can germinate. Churchyards are particularly good for all thrushes in winter, look for fieldfares and redwings as well, often feeding on yew or holly berries.


