

#### **ADVENT – A TIME OF PREPARATION**

(submitted by Barrie)

Advent is traditionally a time of preparation for Christmas. It is said that the door to the stable where Christ was born is very low – and only those who kneel find access. Being ready for Christmas should mean that our thoughts are focused not just on letters, cards and presents, but on repentance, humbling and interior "house-cleaning". John the Baptist warned his hearers to prepare a way for the Lord – to make a clear and level pathway. This involves removing any boulders that stand in the way, and filling in any potholes. The boulders are the things we have done that we should not have done; the potholes are the things we have failed to do which we obviously should have done. The more, as individuals, family or congregation, we are focused in this way, the less we will be overwhelmed by the commercialisation of Christmas.

In the run up to Christmas we remember especially Zacharias and Elizabeth, and the son John who, still in the womb, leapt in anticipation of the coming of the Lord. Christ has come; Christ is risen; Christ will come again.

# **BISHOP JONATHAN...** our former Bishop of Lichfield

**Lichfield Diocesan website reports:** 

Tributes have been paid to the 98<sup>th</sup> Bishop of Lichfield, the Rt Rev'd Jonathan Gledhill, following his death on Monday 1 November. Bishop Jonathan, aged 72, was Bishop of Lichfield from 2003 to until his retirement in 2015, and the Bishop of Southampton prior to that, from 1996 to 2003.

Shortly before his retirement, he announced that he had Parkinson's Disease. Following his retirement, Bishop Jonathan moved to Canterbury with his wife Jane. His successor as Bishop of Lichfield, the Rt Rev'd Dr Michael Ipgrave, said: "Bishop Jonathan was a much loved and fondly remembered Bishop of Lichfield. He was a gentle and kind pastor of his priests and people, a wise teacher of the faith, and a humble and committed disciple of Jesus Christ. "From this diocese, we give thanks for the many ways in which his ministry enriched churches and communities, and we send our condolences to Jane and their family. May he rest in peace and rise in glory."

Born in Windsor and educated at Keele University, which is in the Diocese of Lichfield, and the University of Bristol, Bishop Jonathan served in Chester Diocese as a curate in Marple following his ordination from 1975-78. He then served in various roles in Canterbury Diocese between 1978 and 1996, including as Vicar of St Mary Bredin from 1983-96, as Rural Dean of Canterbury from 1988-94 and as an Honorary Canon at Canterbury Cathedral from 1992-96. He then moved to Winchester Diocese to become the Suffragan (Area) Bishop of Southampton before he was enthroned as the Diocesan Bishop of Lichfield at Lichfield Cathedral in 2003. Following his retirement, after 40 years of ordained ministry, he returned to Canterbury Diocese where he retained Permission to Officiate. The Dean of Lichfield, the Very Rev'd Adrian Dorber, said: "The Cathedral Chapter and the Cathedral community extends its sympathy and condolences to Jane Gledhill and the whole Gledhill family. Bishop Jonathan will be remembered for his pastoral heart, his personal kindness to so many across the Diocese and the warm and generous hospitality he and Jane extended. He was determined to help us all face the imperative of mission whilst encouraging us all to work and learn together. He loved his diocese and his prayer for all its people and communities was systematic and steadfast. May he rest in peace and rise in glory." In a video to announce his retirement released on St Chad's Day in 2015, Bishop Jonathan said: "All our strength and powers are temporary and we all depend upon God whose faithfulness is great. I've found myself singing quietly the hymn quite often, that goes: 'Let all thy days 'till life shall end what'er he send, be filled with praise.' Thank you all so much for your fellowship and companionship in the Gospel. Thank you brother Chad. Thank you Lord, for your love."













## Come follow Christ in the footsteps of St Chad

#### A GENEROUS HOPE

I can't believe it's almost been four years since I travelled to South Africa with a small group led by Bishop Michael to spend time with people and churches in our companion diocese of Matlosane.

Matlosane, which borders the neighbouring Johannesburg Diocese, is a mostly black diocese, home to several townships and believed to be the only one to have a township-based cathedral.

While there, we took part in various services, visited a drug rehabilitation centre and hospice and witnessed the joyous unveiling of the new diocesan centre in Klerksdorp, bought from the Dutch Reformed Church, an historic supporter of the former Apartheid regime.

Several things linger long in my memory. One was to have the pleasure of staying with Father Sam, his wife Lisa and son Biseptho in their modest rectory adjoining the church in the middle of Khuma township. Khuma was a mix of colour, life, vibrancy and desperation. I was warned not to walk out alone, and the roads were not a safe place to be after dark. But the warmth and welcome and joy I encountered in Father Sam's church was unlike any I had ever experienced before. And the singing – the exuberant, lilting, banging worship that felt like it would lift the roof – was literally out of this world.

These were people with little in terms of physical possession who poured their souls out on a Sunday morning and emptied their pockets – often time and time again – during lengthy and celebratory offerings.

Lichfield Diocese's two-way relationship with Matlosane has been mutually beneficial for many years, with churches in the Midlands being enriched by visitors from South Africa and vice versa.

We all know the affect COVID has had on our churches, and the future challenges it poses. Suffice to say, the impact of the pandemic on our brothers and sisters in South Africa has been severe. Clergy have taken a 30% pay cut – if they've been paid at all – and their medical aid has been downgraded.

As a diocese, our Advent focus for 2021 is Generous Hope, reflecting on the God of abundance who supplies all we need, and so much more. # CARBON AND CHURCHYARDS

Now that the COP26 conference in finished I thought it might be useful to think about churchyards in terms of the carbon that they store and the carbon that we use in managing them.

The main ways that churchyards store carbon is through the trees and the grassland that they contain. The trees, particularly large old trees, have been locking away carbon for many years, in the case of ancient yews, perhaps for millennia.

Whilst there is a laudable focus on trees and tree planting at the moment, don't forget that grassland is a fantastic carbon store too, with approximately 30% of global carbon stored within grasslands and their soils \*. Interestingly grasslands which have a wide variety of plant, animal and fungi species store more carbon less diverse ones so churchyard soils may be really important for this as they are teeming with life.



#### To increase churchyard carbon storage and reduce carbon being used, why not:

- Use larger pieces of wood from trees needing felling or pruning for furniture making or wood turning. This locks the carbon away beyond the life of the tree.
- Compost grass cuttings or prunings and create deadwood piles. These all produce humous which improves the capacity of soils to hold carbon.
- Consider replacing petrol mowers and strimmers with battery operated ones, charged with a green electricity supply using wind or solar power.
- ➤ How about scything long grass? Faster than a strimmer and excellent exercise!
- ➤ Reduce the amount of short grass to where you really need it such as recent graves, war graves and memorials and against paths and the church entrance.
- ➤ Consider having medium length grass in some areas this is mown monthly in the growing season with the mower bar set at its highest. This reduces the number of cuts and allows low-flowering plants such as clovers, speedwells and selfheal to thrive.
