




## **'CONNECTIONS'** continues on Sundays

# **Stop to Move Forward**

The world is a busy place. Whether it's the speed of news flying at you, the amount of things you have to fit into 24 hours (whether you have kids to negotiate or not!) or just the way everyone needs something *now:* it's exhausting.

Our lives at church can be no different and it can be hard to find the time, or the energy to stop and think about anything, let alone our 'calling'. We all have one. Even serving coffee is one.

This Easter we're not only trying to slow down and stop to remember God's amazing love for us but Bishop Michael is also offering us an amazing opportunity to slow down, take stock and join in the adventure, the journey, the strategy of the diocese – to grow our faith and love our communities 'following Christ in the footsteps of St Chad'. For many this may feel like 'yet one more thing' to 'do' or find time for – and that would be an understandable response. # **Nature's Calendar for Easter**

In the past, plants were more important for people in charting the passing year than they are now. Many flowers have names that link their flowering time to that of the church calendar with several associated with Eastertide.

Greater stitchwort (*Stellaria holostea*) was also known as Easter Bell and Good Friday Grass is still a commonly used name for Field Wood-rush (*Luzula campestris*). Good Friday Grass is a frequent component of churchyard grassland, particularly in places with either acid or lime-



rich soils. It's brush-like flowers are quite subtle but always appear in time for Easter. Another name for it is Sweep's Broom due to the shape of the flowers.

Another small but beautiful plant to look out for at this time of year is Wood Sorrel (*Oxalis acetosella*) which

has several names including Cuckoo's Bread and Cheese, Granny's Sour Grass and Alleluia as its delicate white flowers appear between Easter and Whitsun, and its trefoil, shamrock-shaped leaves bring associations with the Holy Trinity.





Pasqueflower (*Pulsatilla vulgaris*) also blooms at Easter time, the name Pasque meaning 'of Easter'. It is now rare in the wild, found in a few places where there is ancient, undisturbed grassland on limestone. It is often associated with old earthworks such as barrows, hillforts and boundary banks and there was a legend that it grew where the blood of Danes or Romans had been spilt. \*

It's not only flowers that chart the passing months and

the Christian calendar. St Mark's Fly (*Bibio marci*) is a long, black, shiny fly which hatches around St Mark's Day, April 25th. Large numbers of flies can be found in woodland edges, hedgerows and fields often mating in mid-air giving then the alternate name of Love Bug! They fly rather aimlessly with dangling legs, usually surviving as adults for about one week and getting eaten in large numbers, providing a ready food source. They are also an important pollinator of early flowering trees such as many fruit trees.



As you watch the spring unfurling, spare a thought for our ancestors who used nature as a calendar and lived much closer to a profusion of plants and animals than we do now. Perhaps this could be an inspiration to get involved in nature recovery in our much depleted land.

#### Project Manager Lindsey Stockton writes...

Thank you for your donation of 12kg for February.

I know that February is a short month, but where did it go?! Here are the numbers of people we have helped during the month:

Total vouchers fulfilled	= 82	(81)
No. of Adults fed	= 122	(122)
No. of Children fed	= 62	(74)
Total no. fed	= 184	(196)

As you can see from the figures in brackets for February 2024, the level of need is very similar. We can feel grateful that the figures are not higher, but really we would have hoped to see a bigger reduction in the 12 month period.

Highlights of the month:

A very beneficial meeting with the Manager of our McDonald's restaurant, confirming the ongoing support that the company will provide and arranging a fundraising drive in the week leading up to Easter. So watch out if you are going out for a burger treat, we may grab you!!

A meeting with the Manager from NatWest, which was nowhere near as positive, as it was prompted by the announcement of the branch closure. To give NatWest their due, the Regional Manager did email out to groups who support vulnerable clients to invite them to meet with the Branch Manager. They do seem to be doing as much as they can to prepare their customers for the loss of the branch, and the inevitability of switching to online banking, but it is still going to be so difficult for so many people. They are very much hoping to preserve some sort of human NatWest representation in the town, although it is likely to just be a drop-in as Barclays currently has at the Council offices. I'll keep you updated.

I was invited to hold a coffee morning for parents of Leek High School pupils organised by a member of the Pastoral Care team. This is a regular event, at which different agencies give information regarding the services they provide. It was a really useful morning and I picked up a lot of referrals through my discussions with the parents, so it's something I'll be keen to do again.

Morrisons held the first of three food drives for us in February, and a small group of us went down to try to encourage more donations, which was a very successful venture with 190kg of food. There are further food drives in July and September. Sadly, alongside this support, Morrisons have decided to reduce the number of hours worked by the Community Champions, who act as the liaison between the store and local charities. As a result of this, their pick up a bag scheme will be ending. They do plan to replace it with an alternative scheme but we have yet to see the details.

We are changing our butchers voucher scheme and will now be using Meakins on Derby Street. We have had excellent service from Ash's but felt that we would like to support another local business, hence the change which became effective at the beginning of March. Much to our delight we have just heard that we have been granted £500.00 through the Lidl Community Fund, so this has been assigned directly to this project, as we feel it is so important to be able to give our clients the chance to have fresh produce.

Moving onto a less healthy food option, one of our more unusual donations arrived during the month in the shape of a large quantity of sugar dummies and similar fairground sweet treat items! These were from a lady whose friend had sadly died and she was tasked with distributing the contents of his travelling sweet stall. She is still trying to persuade me to buy a doughnut maker! As I've said numerous times before, it's not just about providing people with food, we also try to put a smile on their faces, and believe me, there have been a lot of very smiley children since this particular donation arrived!

Although we are still blessed with very generous donations, last week did see the need for an order from Asda which cost nearly £600 and by the end of the day we wondered where it had all gone.

When I am doing our shopping list I am only too aware of just how much everything has increased in price, and how difficult people who are trying to manage on a very limited budget are finding it to afford even the basics. There just don't seem to be any cheaper options any more. Our current list of most needed items remains much the same:
