Since Rev Alan retired in July 2020 the question, "When shall we have a new incumbent?" keeps arising. Well there seems to be some news at last! Our Associate Archdeacon Rev Terry Bloor attended our January PCC meeting and announced there had been a "positive development"! The Church Commissioners have now ruled that the original proposal that Horton parish should join with Endon and Bagnall will go ahead and become a new benefice.

This means that the vacancy can now be advertised. However any potential candidate will need to have a clear idea of how each of the three parishes is functioning and be made aware of any particular challenges. St Luke's and St Chad's have already submitted detailed parish profiles to the Archdeacon in preparation for this. Rev Terry will therefore be visiting all three parishes over the next few months taking some services and generally getting to know us so he can give an informed opinion in the decision-making process.

We are also pleased that he has accepted Barrie's invitation to be guest speaker at our Well Dressing service this year. So....watch this space!

From the Church of England website:

In the Western churches, the Epiphany ('manifestation') became an occasion to celebrate one element in the story of Christ's birth, the visit of the far-travelled magi, understood as the manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles. Matthew's account speaks simply of 'wise men from the east'; later tradition fixed their number at three, made them kings and recalled their resonant names – Caspar, Melchior and Balthasar. In this perspective, Epiphanytide is an apt season to pray for the worldwide mission of the Church.

The feast of the Conversion of St Paul, the Apostle to the Gentiles, appropriately falls in the Epiphany season, as does the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. In the Eastern churches, the

Epiphany is, rather, the celebration of Christ's baptism at the hands of John, when the heavens were opened and a voice from heaven declared Jesus to be God's beloved Son. The miracle of Cana in Galilee, where Jesus 'first manifested his glory', follows immediately:

Manifest at Jordan's stream, Prophet, Priest, and King supreme; and at Cana wedding-guest in thy Godhead manifest.

The arrangement of the Sundays of Epiphany in the Revised Common Lectionary deliberately draws out these aspects.

The season of joyful celebration that begins at Christmas now continues through the successive Sundays of Epiphany, and the festal cycle ends only with the Feast of the Presentation (Candlemas). The child who has been manifested to the magi at his birth is now recognized by Simeon and Anna, when he comes to be presented in the Temple according to the Law of Israel. He is both 'a light to lighten the Gentiles' and 'the glory of God's people Israel'. But the redemption he will bring must be won through suffering; the Incarnation is directed to the Passion; and Simeon's final words move our attention away from the celebration of Christmas and towards the mysteries of Easter.

Project Manager Lindsey Stockton writes...

A very Happy New Year to you all! A bit of a cold start to the year but thankfully the SWEP (Severe Weather Emergency Protocol) has been implemented in Staffordshire Moorlands, meaning that anyone who is sleeping rough is provided with emergency

accommodation. The very sad part is that they will be asked to leave this accommodation once the temperatures rise. As many of you know, the lack of homeless provision in Leek is something about which I have huge concerns, and which is particularly hard to see in the winter. We continue to work very closely with other agencies to try to improve the situation.

For those of you who follow football, and are supporters of our local team, you will be only too aware that they seem to have had a big turnaround in form over the last few weeks, with some excellent results. Last time I was writing to you I was about to go out in Storm Darragh to watch them play Hyde United, fully anticipating that the game would be postponed. It wasn't! And massive congratulations to both teams, the match officials and the crowd of just over 400 for enduring the very severe conditions. Thankfully, the weather was considerably better when I, along with 10 of our volunteers, attended the home game against Basford United on 21st December. This was the fixture at which the club was asking their supporters to donate to the Foodbank, and we were delighted to receive £130 in monetary donations and 87kg of food. The club also provided a mascot experience for four children from families we have helped, and they had an amazing day, one which they will remember for a very long time. Not least because Leek won 4-1.....I would love to think that our support does in some way contribute to their resurgence!

We received some very generous donations in December from a variety of sources, schools, churches and local businesses, but I feel that I must make special mention of Endon High School, who donated a simply amazing 558kg of food. Thankfully we had some very willing pupils, (good excuse to get out of their chemistry lesson!), to help ferry the bags and boxes out to our cars, but it did take three cars to get it all back to the Foodbank!

I would also like to say a huge thank you to the Salvation Army for enabling us to provide toys to some of our families. The work they do at Christmas is so vital in so many ways, and we feel very privileged to be able to benefit from their kindness. When you visit them at Christmas and see the vast number of bags of toys ready to distribute you really do appreciate the huge difference they make to families.

Thanks too to Ash's butchers, who assisted us in providing our clients with meat for Christmas dinner. We arranged for them to stock a number of turkey rolls for our clients, which they were able to collect on presentation of a voucher issued by us. We have had very good feedback regarding the quality of the meat and this is something that we would very much like to repeat next year.

It is such a difficult time to see people in need, when there is so much commercialisation and acquisitiveness, so we are very keen to do absolutely everything in our power to help people to have as good a Christmas as possible. Our volunteers are absolutely amazing in the kindness and compassion they show to our clients – they're great all year round, but at Christmas they're even more amazing! – providing such personal wraparound care to all those who come to us. Suffice it to say, there were a great deal of happy tears from our clients through the month.

Due to the amazing support we had both at harvest and Christmas, I have not had to buy in a great deal of stock over the latter part of 2024, but, traditionally, the first quarter of the year sees an increase in demand and a decrease in donations. Thankfully, monetary donations enable us to purchase stock, something which not all Foodbanks are lucky enough to be able to do, and, yet again, a reflection of the hugely supportive community which we are so fortunate to be a part of.

A BREWING SENSE OF PURPOSE

I searched the internet for the word 'vocation'. The first result was Vocation Brewery (other breweries are available!) It's a business that I had never heard of but it immediately piqued my interest as I have been known to sample a few real ales in my time: in particular, the company's tag line - Craftsmanship, Innovation & Patience Combine to Create Masterpieces. Further intrigued, I then discovered that the brewery came into being when its founder 'left his job to follow his calling — to brew the big, flavourful beers he loves'. Vocation is a word used often to describe a call for those who work in what we might describe as the caring professions — medicine and teaching amongst them, and in the church we use it often for those who follow a call to ordination.

At its heart though, vocation is doing the thing that God wants us to do, which brings us joy and means that we might have something of life in all its fullness (John 10:10). In my work in supporting lay and ordained vocations I often describe it as the divine niggle, the thing that you just can't let go of, however much you might try.

I don't know if the founder of Vocation Brewery has a faith, but it seems he understands vocation. In the Christian tradition the Craftsmanship that we have is given to us by God as a gift and honed and shaped by learning and practice as we develop. Being open to the ways that God might be working in our lives and the lives of others brings about new ways of seeing the world and new ways of being (innovation), and patience means that we work at God's pace rather than our own, which can at times be hugely frustrating! These things combined mean that we might become or create 'masterpieces' within our own spheres of work, whether within the church or beyond.

Each of us has a vocation, and our vocations are used in God's service and for the good of our communities. Again, perhaps the website sums it up well: in the 'About us' section there is a tale of overcoming obstacles to create the business, and the final sentence reads 'we pride ourselves on working together with shared purpose, on shared triumphs over adversities, born out of a love of what we do'. There is real joy in doing what we love and so often people think that God is going to ask us to do the thing that we really dread or feel totally unqualified to do. It can take a huge leap of faith to follow a call and fulfill our vocation.

One of the great joys of my role is seeing people grow and flourish in their vocations so if you or someone you know has a divine niggle then be encouraged and encourage one another – who knows where it might lead!

THE WONDERFUL WORLD OF LICHENS

Churchyards are the ideal place for a lichen enthusiast to while away many happy hours. Lichens can be

found on walls, monuments, trees and, if you have ancient grassland there may be lichens within the sward as well.



To the uninitiated lichens can look broadly similar with subtle mosaics of colour, often greys and yellows forming expanding circles as they increase in size as the years go by. There is more to lichens than meets the eye however. Firstly they are two or more organisms living together as one, usually a fungus and an algae. Fungus forms the visible part of the lichen and within, protected by threads of the fungus, are cells of algae and/or cyanobacteria which photosynthesise. So the fungus provides a home and the algae provides food. Lichens reproduce through microscopic fungal spores which, if they find a suitable partner, can colonise surfaces which are not too shaded or too smooth. These spores are released from structures which look rather like tiny jam tarts, flasks or pimples! Lichens are fantastic at surviving where other life cannot. Provided there is enough light and moisture lichens are able to grow on bare stone, not needing cracks or soil to root into. Some lichens grow very slowly, perhaps half a millimetre per year whilst others grow more quickly. Many lichens are long-lived so the lichen you see in a churchyard may be almost as old as the wall or gravestone it is growing on. Astonishingly there are over 2,000 different lichen species and it is not unusual for a single churchyard to contain more than 100 different types.

Churchyards are particularly rich in lichens as they contain so many old stones with a variety of types; limestone, sandstone, granite to name a few. Some stones are smoother, others rough and they may have differing amounts of shade, wind and moisture depending on where they are within the churchyard, which side of the monument the lichen is on, whether they are vertical, leaning or flat. The carving of the inscription itself provides microclimates with different amounts of light and moisture within the lettering. All of these changes in conditions will suit different lichen species. They are also found on trees, wooden fences and gates, grassy areas, pathways and even dustbin lids!



Most lichens offer protection to the surface they grow on and it may be easier to read lettering which is lichen-covered rather than bare, eroding stone. They do not need much care but do

avoid the use of **any** chemicals near to lichens and definitely don't try and remove them. Lichens can die if shaded out so try and keep ivy or other climbers from encroaching over them too. If you have never taken a closer look at a lichen then why not take a hand-lens

or magnifying glass and give it a go. Lichen colonies have been described as minute, self-maintaining gardens, providing a natural cladding for the stone. They are beautiful and endlessly fascinating and if you like a challenge, why not look up the British Lichen Society website and find out more about how to identify them.
