



He will be greatly missed and our love and prayers extend to Linda, Eloise, Claire and all the family.




WORLD DAY OF PRAYER 2025

Friday, March 7th at 2.00pm at Endon Methodist Church All are welcome to take part in this worldwide service.

This year the service has been prepared by the women of the Cook Islands, a group of 15 islands in the southern Pacific Ocean.

On the first Friday in March the Day of Prayer begins on the international dateline, in Samoa. Early in the morning, Christian women begin praying for our world. As the earth rotates, a res of Atlantic, mericas, un finally e the final ridwide mplete. great wave of prayer begins to build. It sweeps across the Pacific, touching Fiji and New Zealand, rolling on through Asia: Japan, the Philippines, Korea, and Bangladesh. The countries of Africa, and the Middle East are next. The wave reaches the shores of Europe as the day dawns there. Across the Atlantic, it moves onwards, the Caribbean, the Americas, and on to the Pacific again until the sun finally sets over American Samoa where the final service takes place. A worldwide circle of prayer is complete.

We have ordered the books that will be needed for those taking part.



GIVING UP (submitted by Barrie)

Jonathan Hill, Lichfield Diocese's Director of Finance contemplates an alternative understanding of 'giving up for Lent'.

We so easily misrepresent Lent as a miserable time of depriving ourselves — of giving up sweet treats or alcohol, other nice things and even joy. But it is really about reflecting Jesus' time in the desert in contemplation and resisting temptation, preparing himself for the years of his public ministry that were about to start. It is a great time for each of us to reflect on our own ministries — we all have them, to family, friends and communities around us: some are very public as clergy and lay ministers, others very quiet through supporting neighbours or words of encouragement or praying for others. It

is often said that the last part of a person to be converted when they come to faith is their wallet, yet tales of generosity and advice on using whatever little wealth we have are the most common topics in the Bible. Some preachers vehemently call for each of us to give exactly ten percent of our income to support the local or global church; a number that comes from the Old Testament: others simply urge considered generosity, following the instruction of St Paul to the Corinthians – "The point is this: whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows bountifully will also reap bountifully. Each one must give as he has decided in his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver." (2 Corinthians 9:6-7). The Church of England recommends giving 5% to the local parish and 5% to other Christian mission. What we each actually give is up to us, unknown to the vicar or PCC or anyone else. What we do know is that our churches, despite the challenges of a secularising nation and reduced voluntary activity across the country, remain key to many communities providing practical and spiritual services. Many people who rarely enter the church value the presence of our buildings at various points in life. And keeping them open relies on the tithes of the faithful and the generosity of visitors. There is good news here – the average regular giver in the Church of England contributes about £15 each week. In Lichfield Diocese the figure is £11.15, not terrible in a diocese with significant pockets of deprivation and amazingly 7% up on prepandemic, pre-cost-of-living-crisis levels. And to those who remain faithful givers, both diocese and parishes are very grateful. However, the number of regular givers has fallen, meaning budgets in parishes generally are squeezed. I find it hard to process the numbers and detailed spreadsheets without a cup of coffee in my hand, and enjoy buying from a well-known retailer on my way to work. But after a few scribbles on the back of a coffee cup, I realised that if I gave up one cup per week and gave its cost to my parish and every other giver did the same, we'd solve the cash-flow issues in our parishes at a stroke. I have resolved to do that with a direct debit through the Giving Direct scheme which sends funds directly to your chosen parish. 11 So my challenge to you this lent is to review your generosity – to your parish church and elsewhere, and do as I have.

DEMENTIA - FRIENDLY CHURCHES

The Diocese of Lichfield has been working to take action on dementia through their Dementia – Friendly Churches network. The focus is on improving inclusion and quality of life for people with dementia and staying in step as patterns change.

The majority of us will know someone in our church, our family or our community affected by dementia. St Luke's Pastoral Team members visit a number of people who have this disease and we would like to know more about it, so that we are better able to understand ways of keeping in step as dementia progresses. Perhaps you too would welcome the opportunity to understand more and so we invite you to journey with us as we aim to increase awareness through sharing information from books, articles, films and other material from the Lichfield Diocese website.

We hope to welcome, understand, respect and support, listen to and learn from people affected by dementia and give space for everyone to participate and contribute.

'Contented Dementia'

By Oliver James: THREE RULES

There are three rules from a book called "Contented Dementia" by Oliver James, which may be really helpful to share in this first article about dementia. They can help us to tune in to the adjustments that we need to make if we are going to keep connections, as dementia progresses.

First, don't contradict: For any of us, if someone is telling us the whole time, "That's not right", our confidence will diminish. Try to be less rigidly attached to facts and to focus on the feelings instead. **Secondly, don't ask questions:** A question puts someone in the spotlight. Will I be able to give the right answer? Do I know the factual information I am being asked? Even a straightforward question can have this impact. Sometimes it's a case of reframing a question, so that it doesn't put the other

person on the spot. Instead of saying, "Would you like a cup of tea?" we might say" I'm going to have a cup of tea. Let's have one together."

Thirdly, learn from the expert: The expert is the person with dementia. Try to see where connections are flowing, notice what increases wellbeing and notice anything that may increase anxiety. It can also be helpful to watch for eye contact; it can quickly show when you have lost someone. The person with dementia is the expert in their own dementia and if you learn from them, you'll learn a lot.



Come follow Christ in the footsteps of St Chad

On the Way to Paradise

My daughter is a huge fan of the TV show 'Death in Paradise' – which means that I end up watching an awful lot of episodes. The plot doesn't change a lot – each one boiling down to the detective having to work out 'The How? The Why? And the Who?' That is: How the murder was committed, why the victim was killed and, of course, who did it.

I've been reflecting over the last few months, since arriving in Lichfield Diocese, on how this formula applies equally well to the process of developing a diocesan strategy – although the ordering is different.

We know the 'Who' from the outset: Jesus Christ; and we know the 'Why', too. At baptism we promise, amongst other things, to 'Come to Christ, the way, the truth and the life'. Coming to Christ means following Him as a disciple, critically bringing other people into relationship with Him, serving those around us. Our diocesan strategy simply helps us to answer the 'How'. How are we, together as a diocesan family, going to be best able to fulfil our calling as disciples, best able to follow Jesus Christ, best able to bring other people into relationship with Him, and best able to serve those around us in this season.

And the emphasis on this season, is important. Our strategy is not something that has been written in the last six months. It is the next stage of a process. Making our priorities Developing Discipleship, Encouraging Vocation and Inspiring Evangelism, we embarked on Shaping for Mission from which emerged the principles and goals of our Strategic Framework. The 'How' that we are now answering is about achieving these goals, overcoming the challenges that we learnt about from parish responses to the framework, and realising our vision of a diocese that is purposeful about evangelism, engaging creatively with local communities, becoming more diverse and growing younger.

In 'Death in Paradise' the puzzle is finally solved by some wildly improbable coincidence — perhaps a throwaway remark that suddenly allows the penny to drop. Fortunately, we don't need to rely on such wild improbabilities, so long as our strategy is underpinned and sustained by prayer (of course, they still may happen, such is the adventure on which we are embarking...).

As we follow Christ in the footsteps of St Chad, we pray that the two million people in our diocese encounter a church that is confident in the gospel, knows and loves its communities, and is excited to find you, O God already at work in your world. We pray for a church that reflects the richness and variety of those communities. We pray for a church that partners with others in seeking the common good, working for justice as a people of hope.

Time for Frogs!

March is the month for frog hunting, they can be seen and heard in ponds around the country with the male frogs the first to move to ponds to wait for the females to arrive. The males call to attract them and



once the females have arrived the male will cling onto the female,

wrapping around her with his fore limbs, using special 'nuptual pads' for extra grip. The female lays her spawn into the pond , the eggs of which are then immediately fertilised by the male. In March a glance into a pond may reward you with views of male and female frogs as well as developing frogspawn. What has this got to do with churchyards and cemeteries? Very few burial grounds have ponds and they are rarely suitable places to install one, apart perhaps from a mini-pond in a Belfast sink or similar. They are however important places for amphibians generally, including frogs. Frogs move to ponds to spawn in the spring but spend much of the rest of their time on land and burial grounds provide excellent habitat for them. They can travel up to 500m away from a pond and will live terrestrially, feeding on slugs, snails and worms as well as catching flies or small moths with their sticky tongues. Frogs will hunt for food in grassland, garden areas, woodland and amongst grass tussocks and scrub. Many burial grounds contain some or all of these habitats in close proximity to each other, a mosaic of different places providing food and shelter depending on the time of year and the weather. Frogs have damp permeable skin and so cannot tolerate many of the chemicals that are used in gardens and farmland. Churchyards and cemeteries tend to be chemical free which also means they can be full of delicious invertebrates. The colour of frogs can be affected by their surroundings and you

might find red or even yellow frogs in some places.

So, you will not find frogs in your local churchyard or cemetery in March, but look in garden ponds surrounding a burial ground and you may find a great many who come to the pond to breed then return for most of the year. Churchyards and cemeteries contain lots of frog-sized spaces, cracks and crevices in the ground, monuments such

as chest tombs with gaps and holes or spaces beneath the roots of old trees. Many of these will be used by frogs for overwintering as are churchyard walls, particularly drystone ones. You can help frogs, as well as other amphibians, by making more habitat for them. How about having some areas of summer meadow or tussocky, rough places round the back and out of sight. Could you pile up some deadwood in a shaded area. A compost heap is also a favourite. Both of these will gentle rot down providing excellent shelter with a larder attached!
