SO HERE'S THE FINAL 'SIMPSON REPORT' DELIVERED BY ROGER AT OUR RECENT APCM

It has not been an easy start to ministry here for Rev Debbie. She moved into the somewhat damp vicarage in September, coping with a family bereavement as well as putting down roots in Endon, and learning to navigate the complexities of the new benefice. The constantly changing pattern of hostilities in the Middle East is part of the background bad news for many of us, but for Debbie it is to do with people and places she knows and loves.

It would be wrong to let this meeting pass without recording the great debt which St Luke's owes to Barrie Jackson for the part he played in keeping St Luke's afloat during COVID restrictions and the interregnum. He quietly coped with most of the routine admin tasks needed for survival of the church, as well as contributing to our pastoral outreach. I think that Barrie and I worked well together as a team. He did most of the work!

None of this could have succeeded without a lot of help from our friends, which included invaluable support from retired clergy, as well as from members of our congregation. Indeed, Revs Philip and Patricia continue to do so. I think that, just as we prayed, we did indeed hand over to Rev. Debbie a church which is in good heart.

A churchwarden is allowed to take service "If a priest be not present" Here, I've really been pushing my luck.

The digital left-overs from past addresses pile up on the desk-top of my computer. That file is fatter than I thought, and goes back over more years than I had imagined. If there is a thread which links the whole lot together, it is that of finding bridges between biblical texts and our daily life. Pre-stressed concrete, antibiotics and the age of the universe have all been discussed from this lectern. I was delighted to hear the Gospel story of doubting Thomas linked by Rev. Debbie to the etiquette of asking the father of the bride for his approval.

As the years roll on, I find myself increasingly sure about the truths embedded in the bible, and increasingly unsure about the so-called realities of my daily life.

Against this background, kindnesses great and small shine out more than ever. Increasingly, I find myself at the receiving end, and I am coming to realise that there can be grace in accepting help as well as in giving it.

This has been the last Warden's Report that I intend to write. However, I've been told that there's a more than worthy successor waiting in the wings. Hooray!

I've been a Warden of this church for about 20 years, and I was Warden of another St Luke's for four years before that. So, it's high time for me to give a cheery wave and bow out of this position, which I have filled all too inadequately for all too long.

(I'm sure we would all strongly disagree with that last statement Roger and we are greatly indebted to you for your dedication and tireless "devotion to duty" on behalf of us all at St Luke's for so many years.)

With deep sadness, we share that Sue passed away peacefully in her sleep in the early hours of Saturday 20th June, after an eight-year battle with cancer. Though she is no longer with us, she is now at peace in glory, and held in our hearts for all eternity."

Not surprisingly on July 16th Carmountside crem was packed with people for the celebration of her life. She touched so many lives. All of us who have lost loved ones will heartily endorse Roger's quote: ***"Grief is the price you pay for Love."***

Lindsey Stockton, Project Manager, writes...

Dear Friends and Supporters

So here we are in July, another month gone and we have now passed the longest day. We even saw some Christmas items in our supermarket collections this week, obviously clearing out last year's stock ready for this year.....!

Here is the latest news from the Foodbank, starting with the figures, with comparison to last year:

Total vouchers fulfilled	=	73 (71)
No. of Adults fed	=	95 (93)
No. of Children fed	=	42 (49)
Total no. fed	=	137 (142)

So, a quieter month, and figures very similar to this time last year.

Several of the clients we are seeing are in the position where they just don't have enough money to cover their outgoings and so have little option but to seek foodbank support on a regular basis.

Trussell are just launching their Guarantee our Essentials Summer of Action, which is calling for the government to set up an independent process for setting the basic amount of Universal Credit, much like the one which already exists for setting the National Minimum Wage and National Living Wage. The recommendation is that the level of UC should be decided by an independent panel of experts alongside those who have experience of living on Universal Credit. We as a foodbank will be taking part in this campaign, asking for your feedback and support, which we will then be passing onto our MP.

June saw the official opening of Better Way Recovery based at Leek Moorlands Hospital which offers peer led support for anyone struggling with addiction. I was delighted to attend their opening and am just overwhelmed by what they are doing. They work side by side with STaRS (Staffordshire Treatment and Recovery Service) to help people negotiate their journey to recovery, and a number of our clients are already attending their sessions on a regular basis.

We were delighted to be approached by High Peak Comps with the offer of support in the form of £100 worth of food, all chosen from our shopping list, so the items we need the most. Whilst some may not agree with this type of organisation, or accepting support from them, it is obvious from their social media pages that they provide a huge amount of invaluable support to local organisations and charities. Alongside the food donation, they have also provided us with an Amazon gift voucher to use as a prize in a forthcoming raffle.

We also received a donation of £200 from the Aberrant Group, a franchise which runs a number of McDonald's restaurants, including the Leek branch. They have been ongoing supporters since they first opened in the town, so we thank them for their continued donations.

During the summer we will have a presence at a number of events. Whilst we don't have our own stand at Leek Show, one of our Trustees will be in the Rural Churches Together tent. We have the Outside Arts stall in the Butter Market on Wednesday 12th August and we shall be at Action West End's Family Fun Day at Westwood Recreation Ground on Saturday 5th September. So please come along to see us if you are able.

I would like to take this opportunity to promote Easyfundraising – www.easyfundraising.org.uk This is a great way of raising money for your chosen charity or charities, as all you have to do is sign up, buy the products you would usually buy, and, assuming that that particular retailer is signed up with

easyfundraising (they have over 8000 retailers), a percentage of the money you spend is then passed onto the charity. So, no extra expense for you and a lovely donation for us! You can choose to support more than one charity and then simply choose which charity to give to each time you make a purchase.

Please consider signing up for this, and, if you are already signed up but have nominated a different charity, please consider adding us to your account as well. Thank you.

Come follow Christ in the footsteps of St Chad

JOIN THE JOURNEY OF GROWTH

Someone once said “Not everything that counts can be counted” – and when it comes to our faith it is hard to see a way of ‘measuring’ where we are at with God. Indeed, do we need to?

Whilst the national church demands our attendance and finance figures (both essential to track), we might see our spiritual growth and deepening of our discipleship as equally – or if not more - important to consider.

The Church Development Tool is a refreshed online survey tool which can help whole congregations better understand themselves and how they feel about their faith.

Launched on 1 June, it is free, anonymous and now housed on the Online Parish Returns platform. It can enable congregations to have their voice heard about the life and ministry of the church and includes modules on diversity, children & young people, lay ministry, giving and discipleship.

With only 22 questions in total, even a church conducting all six modules will find it quick and easy to administer and gather the results from. You can then run it twelve months later for example and compare the results to monitor your journey.

In my role as Whole Life Discipleship Officer, I was particularly interested in the discipleship module – thought-provoking questions such as ‘How often do you pray?’ and ‘to what extent you feel you have someone you trust to share questions about God’ prompted me to reflect personally - irrespective of any wider results. So as a diocese we offered to help pilot the ‘CDT’ with a few churches to gather feedback on the process and the questions – then suggest tweaks – to help those at Church House developing this nationally.

If you are interested in running the survey at your church, see the link below for more information. It could be as a one-off snapshot or as part of a wider development piece – either way please do get in touch with me and I can set that up for you. I can even come and talk it through with church leaders / PCC if that is helpful.

I am excited to see what this survey can do to support our churches to celebrate what is going well – and identify areas ripe for development. Whilst our walk with God is never straightforward or something we can quantify easily, my prayer is that the Church Development Tool is a means of us all joining in the journey forward – together. You never know, it might even lead to more souls in our services praising God with us.

Just another Butterfly on the Wall

As August rolls in, you might start to see some new wings fluttering in your local churchyard. The Wall Brown or Wall butterfly is named after its habit of basking casually on walls or rocky places. This behaviour allows the butterfly to raise its temperature enough to fly around comfortably. Perfectly camouflaged against stones, the best way to identify the species is by checking the eyespots on its wings. One large eyespot on the forewing and four smaller ones on the hindwing is a dead giveaway that you have a Wall on your hands.

The Wall's habitat is diverse across England and Wales, spanning coastal zones, open grassland, disused quarries, railway edges, gardens, field edges and even churchyards and cemeteries. They may be found in sunny spots, basking on warm stone monuments, walls surrounding the churchyard, or the gravel of kerbed graves. Walls lay their eggs on grass tussocks and the broader leaves of coarse grasses such as Yorkshire Fog. Larvae and caterpillars will munch away on the grasses, while the butterflies rely on a variety of grassland wildflowers for nectar.

Inland Wall populations saw dramatic decreases in the 1980s, but not for the reasons you might expect. Habitat loss and degradation or abandonment of traditional farming or forestry practices didn't fit the bill for the Wall, so researchers instead had to come up with other theories.

Belgium researchers discovered they were witnessing similar decline with their Wall populations, so decided to do some digging. They proposed that warming climates were causing the species to have a third brood late in the year, leaving little time for the caterpillars to develop before winter. This brood was then unfortunately lost, causing the downward spiral.

Though, this might not be the end for the inland populations. Many butterfly species can change their voltinism (the number of generations produced per year). This flexibility allows species to respond quickly and often unexpectedly to years with favourable conditions, producing more broods than would be typical. Based on this principle, we can expect inland Wall populations to experience strong natural selection as climates warm, eventually recovering and becoming as resilient as their coastal relatives, where temperatures are more consistent.

It's a waiting game for the Wall, but in the meantime, we can be doing our part to support the species. Leaving coarse, grassy and sunny patches in your churchyard or garden gives them places to do their sunbathing. Creating gorgeous wildflower meadow areas gives the Wall, as well as many other pollinators and invertebrates, lots of variety for food. If you spot a Wall, be sure to record it in your iNaturalist app or send us a photo, especially if you see one in your local churchyard or burial ground. Every record builds a picture of just how important burial grounds are for wildlife.

MEERBROOK HAS CONNECTIONS TO ENDON CHURCH!

Ros writes...

On visiting the Flower Festival at Meerbrook Church recently with Hilary Holt I spotted a brass plaque which caught my attention because it commemorated no fewer than 3 successive vicars of Endon. Curiously all 3 were called Daniel Turner and had Master of Arts degrees from Oxford starting with Rev Daniel Turner II (b 1752) and was son of Rev Daniel Turner I who was incumbent at Meerbrook, Rev Daniel Turner III (b 1786) who was son of Rev Daniel Turner II, and Rev Daniel Turner IV (b 1799) son of Rev James Turner I. The plaque also states that they all frequently officiated at Meerbrook. However I checked our own plaque on the chancel wall in St Luke's and discovered that there had indeed been a Rev Daniel Turner vicar in 1852 who must have been Daniel Turner IV but no mention of the other three. Can anyone shed any more light of this? It seems that benefices of two or more parishes may not be a new trend! Perhaps Meerbrook was attached to St Edward's in Leek at one time since the patron of our Endon Parish is whoever is the incumbent of St Edward's, Leek (currently the Rural Dean, Rev Nigel Irons.)

It's not so bad while the ground is so dry, the camp looks almost homely but when the rains come it's a different story. We just do the best we can, despite feeling so helpless.

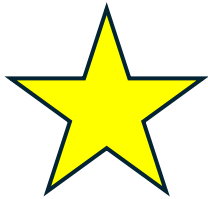

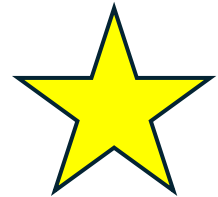
